Historical Nanterre



Nanterre is overflowing with history that dates from the Neolithic Age to the present day! Do not miss the old town centre and the Rue Volant (Nanterre's most ancient street) or the Sainte Geneviève Cathedral (which is a listed historical monument).

You can also discover signs of Nanterre's architectural heritage, which are spread across the town, whether it be in the form of the traces of its agricultural past or the buildings erected by renowned architects or by simply observing its industrial history.

Enjoy short breaks to taste some local produce, of which the most well-known is the famous Nanterre brioche.

The place to do business

Nanterre is the ideal place to hold congresses or business meetings as it is within such easy reach of La Défense, a district that disposes of numerous hotels, reception rooms and other activities.

Out-of-the-ordinary

Did you know? You can actually spot a mill in Nanterre! You can also take part in agriculture-cum-poetry activities at the Ferme du Bonheur, (a nearby farm



where former farm workers teach groups fascinating agricultural theory and basic practices). You can also have a good time re-connecting with nature by joining in in one of the activities on offer at Vive les Groues, (former industrial wasteland laboured collaboratively by locals to create a new ecosystem).

Sportive Nanterre



Nanterre disposes of numerous infrastructures designed for athletes. For lovers of open-air activities make the most of the town's numerous large parks, the cycling tracks (Avenue Verte and the La Seine à Vélo) and areas designed

for street workouts - there's even a skate park!

Whether it be the André Malraux Park with its air of Central Park, or the one at the Chemin de l'Ile on the banks


of the River Seine,

By public transport: Take either the RER A train, which stops at three stations in Nanterre, (Nanterre Ville, Nanterre Université and Nanterre Préfecture), or the L suburban line and alight at Nanterre Université.

Several bus routes also operate via Nanterre.
